Association for the Study of Higher

Education (ASHE) enters second year of
hosting with WVNET —- ASHE moved
their organization's web resources, where
they do conference planning, membership

registration and generally run their worldwide organization to be hosted by WVNET in 2012. The services provided by WVNET were powerful enough to handle their custom software to manage a record number of conference proposals (1,280) in 2012 and the peer review of these proposals. This integrated 600 reviewers with the 1,280 proposals to qualitatively and quantitatively evaluate the selection of 47 percent of the proposals submitted for presentation at the Association for the Study of Higher Education conference. ASHE recently opened their proposal submission and volunteer system with expectations for another record number of proposals submitted and reviewers volunteered.

ASHE's reliance on WVNET for up-time of their web services insures that the organization has a consistent operation for their conference, registration and elections. ASHE operations have functioned without interruption since moving their services to WVNET insuring that the organization can focus on serving their membership.

The argos-admin list will be used to discuss what each of the institutions would need or like to be trained on for Argos. WVNET has contacted Evisions for the next round of training and depending on demand we will have report writer training and/or data block designer training.
