n May 16th, WVNET launched the second MOOC [Massively Open Online Course] in West Virginia. The first was offered by WVU in February http://eberly.wvu.edu/eberly.news/2013/1/23/wvu-offers-mooc--free--four-week-online-course-open-to-the-public

Our MOOC is SDN-OPS and is a hands-on, practical learning experience of the many types of software-defined networking tools [SDN]. WVNET has been on the learning curve for SDN for the past year as we worked with RENCI at Duke to stand up the first Cisco ExoGENI Rack in the world.



Software-defined networking is rapidly changing the network environment, but it is very difficult to learn how to actually install and use things like OpenFlow and OpenStack. You have to know someone who has done it and persuade them to show you how to do it. Then they must watch you as you try it until you get it right.

WVNET's MOOC lets students from all over the world learn how to do this for free!



We have recruited the most qualified faculty in every area of the SDN Community. WVNET TRAINING SCHEDULE ARGOS CLASSES

Class 1: DataBlock Designer - June 11, 12, 13, 2013. Hosted at WVNET in Morgantown. *Argos "power users"* who create DataBlocks and reports (should be familiar with SQL and database table structure). DataBlocks are containers that hold SQL queries, which return data from you institution's data sources. Come ready with ideas for data blocks to use on your campus as these blocks will be made available to your users in the report writers training.

Class 2: Report Writer - June 25, 26, 27, 2013. Hosted at WVUP in Parkersburg. Intermediate users who use pre-built DataBlocks to build a variety of reports (should be comfortable learning new software tools). Class 3: Report Writer - July 16, 17, 18, 2013. Hosted at SWVCTC in Logan.
