

WV Network Partners With URcast to Expand Student Learning Content

The West Virginia Network, which is a branch of the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, recently announced it has partnered with URcast to provide access to learning content for K-12 students throughout West Virginia without Internet connections.

URCast is a content distribution application customized for K-12 students, according to the HEPC, and it provides caching services that allow students to view content on computers, tablets or smartphones even without an Internet connection.

The process reallocates bandwidth and puts a caching server within the school.

“Caching speeds up student Internet access so classroom time is learning time, not waiting time,” said Paul Hill, HEPC chancellor. “A faster speed of delivery can provide students with more personalized learning experiences and give teachers greater opportunities to engage their students on the lesson at hand.”

Mt. Vernon Elementary School in Barbour County has been participating in the program as a pilot school. The school has been able to provide books and videos for students' devices that can be accessed on the school bus and at home on weekends or snow days.

“Access to technology is an essential component of a world class education,” said West Virginia Superintendent of Schools Michael Martirano. “The partnership between WVNET and URcast will provide our staff and students with a valuable tool to help cross the digital divide and make learning exciting, relevant and meaningful.

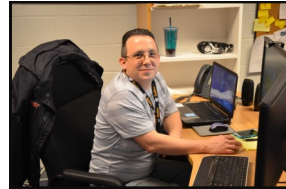

NOC TECH MINUTE

Let's explore a day in the life of technology. Let's make it fun and use a day off, a Saturday, a day that is a balance of getting things done for life: errands, some banking, some necessary personal upkeep; haircut, new jeans, and some fun: lunch at the new deli and a drink with a friend. Technology affects all of these. Technology affects time and time affects technology. It's a final blow and saving grace all wrapped into one changing ball.

A piece of technology that is in the process of changing is credit cards. There are new types of credit cards in the works, from credit cards equipped with Bluetooth to ones that make tokenized payments from other cards using a magnetic stripe. One card in development uses Apple Pay in credit card form.

There is a card called the Stratos which is the first credit card to use bank-level encryption, generating a unique token at each transaction that must be decrypted by the bank to charge the card. It is claimed that the Stratos all-in-one credit card will organize your wallet. Users will be able to add credit, debit, gift, and membership cards into this one card. The card has dual-stripe technology and will work anywhere other credit cards are used.

The Stratos card is smart and will work and coincide with smartphones. Users will be able to sync other credit cards from the Stratos mobile app. The card has some unique features like touch sensors which will eventually use fingerprint security when the card is upgraded, and the ability to submit payment via Near Field Communication (NFC) so that it only needs to be in close proximity to a payment device rather than swiped.

The upgrades and unique features of this tech-driven credit card do come with a price. There is a membership fee, but as a consumer I think the price is worth it as long as the card lives up to its potential. If I can use one credit card for everything I do, and it is secure and will make my life easier, then I am sold.

Businesses are eventually going to stop accepting old school swipe-based transactions. The Stratos card will become a nice bookmark for this piece of technology. Is this card going to be safer and more secure than the cards we use today? Will this technology mean the end to currency? Is this technology going to define how we purchase items via internet? All of these questions, only time can answer.

The WVHETC 2015 Conference Committee announces Dr. Robbie K. Melton (*pictured*) will serve as the Keynote Speaker at this year's conference. Dr. Melton will speak on *"Are Emerging Smart Devices Smarter than You? Standards of Quality for Teaching and Learning with Mobile Technology Tools."*

Robbie K. Melton, Ph.D. is the Associate Vice Chancellor of Mobilization Emerging Technology for Tennessee Board of Regents. Melton serves as the chief system level administrator to oversee the system's mission and initiatives for the Strategic Mobilization Quality Assurances, Faculty and Student Use of Mobile Devices related to teaching, learning, training, and workforce development, and the coordination of research, product testing, pilots and security safety networks. She has published and presented around the nation on the impact and value of mobilization for education and the workforce and has acquired a new distinction as an *"App-ologist"* due to her study of the pedagogy and best teaching practices with mobilization, quality standards for the utilization of mobile apps, and for her creation of the Mobile App Education and Workforce Resource Center (50,000+ Apps that have been aligned with over ninety-five subject areas from Pre-K to Ph.D., including workforce careers, professional development and lifelong learning, according to one's mobile device of choice).

Dr. Robbie K. Melton has prepared a *"Mobile App Educational and Workforce Resource Center"* that contains over 20,000 apps from PreK-Careers and a listing of *smart educational iGadgets* at www.APPAPEDIA.org

Melton is the winner of numerous awards, the latest being CDE Top 30 2014 Technologists, Transformers and Trailblazers, 2013 Apple Distinguished Educator, 2012, WCET Technology WOW Award.
