

Barbour County School Celebrating Technology Integration

Kids were excited at Mount Vernon Elementary School in Barbour County Friday morning as they celebrated the school's partnership with WVNET, a program that's put tablets into the hands of third and fourth graders there that they use regularly in their education.

"It's been really fun. If we have snow days, we do it on that, but if you don't have Internet, the tablets don't even have to have Internet to do it," said fourth grader Makensi Bennett.

It's part of what staff call a flipped classroom. Instead of learning new concepts at school, kids become familiar with the basics at home, and refine their knowledge in school. And those tablets keep them connected to their lessons

"The ones that have Internet are emailing me constantly, back and forth. They want to make sure what they've done is OK, they send me PowerPoints, they send me attachments, they send me videos. But the ones that don't have internet can just use their tablets, they're so excited to have a tablet for one thing," said MVES Principal Tammy Tucker.

WVNET is a project of the Higher Education Policy Commission, who is working to extend the caching service to reach out to other schools, something they said Mount Vernon has been helpful in promoting.

"Use this with their students, they embraced the technology, they're actually being with a champion and out talking to other schools about the benefits of the caching services and of URcast Network," said WVNET's Booker

And Tucker said it's not technology for its own sake. She's seen a difference in all the kids' learning.

"They're excited about learning. The students that struggle are not struggling as much anymore or at all because they already have watched videos that introduce the skill before I introduce it," Tucker said.

Welcome to "Applications Corner!" This monthly article will provide focus on new topics each month where the WVNET Applications group is working to *enhance education through technology*. The feature this week is Ellucian Banner.

The Applications Group hosts Banner for 11 institutions, providing updates to Banner on request, daily backup of data,

and functional support of Banner operations. The Applications functional support team consults with users of Banner Financial Aid, Accounts Receivable, General, Finance and Student. WVNET Applications technical support staff ensure operation of Oracle databases, Banner upgrades and security and are happy to answer any questions you may have.

Banner is used by every public higher education institution in West Virginia. It allows institutions to manage students from matriculation and course registration to financial aid application and awarding, student billing and payment, and graduation; and includes modules for institutional finance and payroll. Banner is a complex product made up of inter-working operational systems, each designed to handle one of the above–required functions. West Virginia institutions generally have people logged into Banner from morning till night with active concurrent users averaging 450 at any point during the day.

WVNET supports Banner on an IBM Power System with Oracle databases, Oracle Weblogic Middleware and Self-service providing the power to manage the needs of faculty, staff and students at 11 institutions. This sharing of resources ensures efficiency of operation and great availability of computing resources. The Applications Team is here to provide the services you need to help your students succeed.
