WVNET RELEASES STUDENT PERFORMANCE DASHBOARD TO BLACKBOARD CUSTOMERS



Blackboard is the industry standard in online learning, and WVNET operates this software for over a dozen public universities and colleges around the state. Developers and other third-parties are able to add new functionality to Blackboard through the use of "building blocks" which are collections of Java code that can be installed into a Blackboard instance.

In late June, WVNET installed a new building block for all of their Blackboard customers: the Student Performance Dashboard. This building block, developed in-house by *Systems Programmer Jonathan Lynch*, adds a web page to Blackboard that allows teachers, deans, and guidance counselors to get a top-down view of how students are doing across all of their online courses. Without this building block, faculty had to click into every individual course to get this information, an arduous task for a dean overseeing hundreds of classes!

"The Student Performance Dashboard will allow instructors to identify students who fall behind, contact them, and offer assistance as needed," writes Harmony Garletts, e-Learning Specialist at Pierpont Community & Technical College. "Our faculty is very excited about this new tool."

The inspiration for the building block came from Dr. Mary Stewart, who in addition to being the Associate Director of WVROCKS, is also the Director of Distance Learning and Educational Services at WVNET. She originally wanted a simple database report on lagging students, but the idea evolved into a full-fledged application. According to Mary, "One of the greatest challenges for online educators is student retention. We needed a streamlined solution that would give us a global snapshot of student performance with the click of a button, and that is just what Jonathan created for us."

The end result was a simple but user-friendly tool that uses percentages to show how each student is progressing in the course. Students are not only compared to themselves, but also to other students in the same course, making it easy to see how the class is progressing as a whole.

Each student is given a color from green to red to help instructors direct their attention.

The response has been positive overall. Just take it from Jake Bolen, the Director of Distance Learning at Mountwest Community & Technical College, who commented, "My hope is that the ease of using this tool will encourage faculty to check on the students in their courses more often. We are lucky to have a Blackboard team at WVNET to develop custom applications like this."

Although they were originally talking about selling the application, WVNET eventually decided it made sense to release the tool to their customers for free. "Our mission is not just to host Blackboard but to add value for our customers," said Steven White, Manager of the Systems department at WVNET.



DOCUMENT INSPECTOR FEATURES FOR EXCEL, POWERPOINT AND WORD

It's good practice to remove hidden data and personal information before sharing Microsoft Office documents. Microsoft's Document Inspector tool helps to follow this practice. The Inspector checks for these items and other metadata such as tracked changes and comments within your document. In some cases, it will remove them. In other cases it will alert if it can't perform the removal automatically.

Before using the Document Inspector, ensure that you save a copy of it because the data removed by the Document Inspector may not always be possible to restore. This is very important to note.

After saving a copy of the original document, open the document and then click the *File* tab in the Ribbon. Then, click *Info*. In the *Info* section, click *Check for Issues*. Choose *Inspect Document* from the drop-down menu.



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In the Document Inspector dialog box that appears, click the checkboxes for the types of data to find and remove.

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When you are ready to continue, click the Inspect button. Word then displays any hidden information for the selected categories in a results page.

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For each category's results, click the "Remove All" button to remove all the data shown within that category.

If you want to keep your Word documents clean of information that shouldn't be distributed, this is an easy way to remove hidden history.

If you want to preserve tracked changes or comments in a document and you want to share the document without others seeing the tracked changes and comments, the best solution is to keep separate copies of the document. Create a public copy for distribution, and keep a private copy for yourself.
